With that in mind, if you haven't yet paid your 2008 membership dues, please do so soon. You may mail a check, made out to the Astronomy Club of Akron, to me at 8019 Glendevan St NW, Massillon, OH 44646. If you prefer, you may pay cash to me or to the assistant secretary/treasurer, Rosaelena Villaseñor. Be sure to get a receipt. Finally, we have a new payment option to offer. If you want to pay online and you have a PayPal account, you can send payment to paypal@acaoh.org. We have joined the 21st Century! Keep in mind, that with PayPal there is a fee of 2.9% plus 30 cents for a transaction that the club receives via PayPal. For example, the dues for an adult membership is \$30. If you find it most convenient to pay via PayPal, you need to send \$30, plus 2.9% of \$30 (which is 87 cents), plus 30 cents, for a grand total of \$31.17. It's up to you whether the \$1.17 is worth the trade off of an envelope, addressing the envelope, stamping the envelope, and mailing the envelope. It's way cooler to use PayPal!

Another reason that the club can benefit from a service like PayPal is that it is a new way to receive donations. I will update the club website with the PayPal information which gives donors another way to help the club. Additionally, if I want to

sell something via eBay, I may opt to have the proceeds sent to the club's PayPal account. I get rid of my old junk and I do some good for the club. Donors may decide that this is useful way of helping the club too. The club will issue a letter to the donor, acknowledging the donation so that the donor may claim it on his or her tax return.

Observatory Report

On Astronomy Day May 10th, ACA held a public star party at the observatory. Seven members and three public attendees joined the event. This star party featured a tour through the solar system. First up was a five day old Moon. Even before sunset, the 14 inch telescope showed impressive detail of the lunar surface. At twilight, Mercury was in the field of view and appeared as a tiny first guarter moon. Lew Snodgrass was able to locate Mercury with binoculars and as darkness increased we were able to spot Mercury by naked eve. Mercury was four days from greatest elongation and this was the best viewing of Mercury for 2008. Saturn was the showstopper, as we all took repeated looks through the eyepiece at the giant gas planet and its family of moons. Mars completed the solar system tour and appeared as a small orange featureless disk set amid some scattered background stars.

May 24th was the date for our Annual Telescope Seminar. A large high pressure system was sitting directly over Ohio at star party time providing clear skies. Dave Jessie, John Crilly and I explained the design and operation of refractor, reflector, and compound telescopes and binoculars to a crowd of about twenty public attendees. After the seminar with the Moon out of the sky and good seeing conditions, fifteen of our members were able to demonstrate to the public the performance of each type of telescope on planets and deep sky objects.

Our annual Solar & Lunar Hotdog Roast and star party was scheduled for June 7th starting at 6:00pm. The skies were cloudy all day and NOAA forecasted thunder storms for the afternoon and evening. I occasionally think about that story and wonder if that is the reason why Bud's hair always stands straight up. Well, maybe. Clouds were forecasted to dissipate slowly and we still held out hope of having our star party. By 7:30pm the satellite image showed a little promise of possible clearing and the local news forecast decreased the chance of thunderstorms. I decided to open the observatory at 9:00pm for anyone wanting to observe the night sky. I really didn't expect any members to show up for the star party considering the sky conditions and no members did show up; however, to my surprise, the pub-

lic slowly starting arriving at the observatory and by 9:30pm, the observatory was filled with 30 public attendees ranging from children to senior citizens. These people wanted to see stars! I really couldn't believe it. The clouds did dissipate and clear skies prevailed. The Moon opened the show and many first time observers were astonished at what they saw. It was fun to listen to their expressions. We slewed to Saturn and the expressions increased in intensity. I could hardly field all the questions this group asked. As night continued, we slewed the telescope to the east to view M13. With the Moon to our back, the globular cluster looked beautiful. Mars, M57, and the Ghost of Jupiter all got their chance in the eyepiece. A view of Vega was requested by a young man who wanted to see the star Jodie Foster traveled to in Carl Sagan's novel turned movie - Contact. It was after 11pm when the last of the public observers called it a night. It turned out to be a pretty exciting night. We will reschedule our Solar & Lunar Hotdog Roast in July.
